2. Minutes of the Meeting on 14 March 2019:

Acceptance of the minutes of the meeting on 14 March was proposed by Kevin Kerr and seconded by Arthur Marris, subject to a minor change. Carried.

3. Matters Arising:

4. Finances:

Arthur Marris reported.

The bank account now stands at £2,128.58.

5. Off-road biking at the Murieston Trail:

In the past two weeks several young people have been adapting an area of the Murieston Trail for off-road biking. The Council has had to intervene to stop the activity as this is potentially dangerous for pedestrians and bikers alike.

Jamie, Lewis and Scott attended tonight's community council meeting to make the case for having a permanent off-road biking facility in the area. It was agreed that the Community Council supports their objective and that details of tonight's discussion will be minuted.

The young people argued that the Murieston area is lacking leisure facilities and there is a need for outdoor activities for younger people. Biking is a growing recreational sport and the area would benefit from a safe riding space for off-road and mountain biking. This could be on a small section of land, providing a small bike trail/track. Even a short distance of just 50m might be enough.

The Livingston Skatepark at Almondside can be used for BMX biking but does not cater for off-road biking.

The bike track and trails at the Cathkin Braes exemplifies the type of facility that is wanted.

It was agreed that the Linhouse Trail may be the best location to site a local facility.

Options and safety issues were discussed. Kevin Kerr suggested there may be an existing template or framework.

Councillor Shemilt said she would discuss with the Council's Open Space Officer, Becky Plunkett with a view to finding some suitable Council-owned land as a first step to achieving a properly funded, designed and constructed bike track/trail.

Arthur Marris confirmed that the Community Council endorse their initiative and support the development of this project. It was suggested they try and find out what other cycling groups had achieved in doing a similar project with a view to using them as role models. We will offer further guidance where we can and the young people will be welcome to come back at a future meeting as their project develops.

6. Councillors' Reports:

Councillor Moira Shemilt

Councillor Shemilt said she had also attended the opening of Alzheimer's Scotland new Livingston office at Grampian Court.

The Council budget cuts have started to bite.

13. Livingston South Station:

The lifts appear to have been completed but are not in use yet.

Two ticket machines are installed on the Edinburgh bound platform but none on the Glasgow platform.

Lorna Cooper noted that there was broken glass beside the recycling bins. Councillor Shemilt suggested that the bins may have become full before being emptied.

14. Litter Pick:

As MEG may be holding a litter pick in early May, it was agreed that we will organise a litter pick on Sunday 22 September, starting at 1pm. The Secretary will book Murieston Village Hall for volunteers to congregate.

15. Planning Applications:

Tarbert Drive (ref. 0927/FUL/18)

Additional soil testing was carried out on behalf of the applicant last week. There was no sign that health and safety precautions were followed on or off site. For instance, soil was deposited along Tarbert Drive from the tyres of plant traffic.

Bankton House (0955/FUL/18)

The applicant has been advised to provide an engineer's report on flood risk at the proposed site.

Wellhead Farm (922/MSC/18)

We have not been informed if the application will be heard at the planning meeting next week. Objectors are advised to request to speak at the meeting.

Kevin Kerr noted that postal objections were not appearing in the Documents section on the Council planning website. Ian Brown said he has written to the Planning Service for clarification.

16. Community Council Meetings in 2019/2020 Session:

The Secretary reported that we are invited to apply for room lets for the 2019/2020 session of meetings. It was agreed we would book the Staff Room at Williamston Primary again on the second Thursday of each month from September to June 2020.
